



Executive Summary

The **Canberra Lyric Theatre** is the cornerstone project in the evolution of Canberra's Civic and Cultural Precinct, delivering a world-class performing arts venue that reflects the city's cultural aspirations and its role as Australia's capital. The project supports the broader objectives of this key cultural hub within central Canberra.

The design is founded by a recognition of Country, honouring the First Nations people as Traditional Custodians of the land and embedding respect for culture and heritage into every stage of planning and design. Reflected in users journeys through the building and the building's expression in materiality and built form, opportunities to celebrate the city's cultural origins have been adopted throughout.

The theatre aims to be an inclusive and welcoming cultural beacon - celebrating diversity, ensuring universal accessibility, and providing equitable experiences for all patrons and performers. The auditorium design balances intimacy with technical excellence. The 2,000-seat auditorium (1,000 stalls, 500 circle, 500 balcony) almost doubles on the capacity of the current theatre, enabling larger productions to showcase their talents in the ACT.

The building is sited to provide a generous public forecourt to the north and aligns the fly tower with the existing Playhouse theatre to continue the rhythm of built form massing along key public frontages. Operationally, the scheme provides enhanced back-of-house functions through the inclusion of a shared loading dock for the Lyric and Playhouse theatres, consolidating service functions in a discrete location further enhances public realm and pedestrian amenity outcomes across the site.

The external expression of the building is defined by verticality, layering, and veiling; mediating between transparency and enclosure while framing views to Black Mountain and Vernon Circle. The result is a performance venue that harmonises with Canberra's civic fabric, embraces cultural inclusivity, and sets a new benchmark for accessibility and artistic experience in the ACT.




1.1 Site Context

The subject site (Block 23, Section 19, Canberra City) holds a prominent position in Canberra City. It is situated along the Main Avenue/ Approach Route to Parliament House, Northbourne Avenue. Whilst located at the edge of the Civic Centre, the site is situated at the knuckle of Vernon circle, therefore holding an edge of the Municipal Centre within the city's urban fabric at City Hill.


1.2 Key Site Planning Objectives


GRIFFIN LEGACY DIAGRAM KEY NODES AND AXIS

National

Noting the relationship to the Griffin Legacy, the site is located on Designated Land and is therefore subject to Works Approval under the National Capital Plan (NCP).

The NCP locates the site within the City Hill Precinct, which describes the area as the municipal heart of central Canberra. The City Hill Precinct forms the Griffin's symbolic and geographical centre for the City - a corner completing the National Triangle as a gateway to the Central National Area and a hub connecting significant main avenues and vistas.

1.3 Civic Context - Views & Vistas

- The north-east frontages of the site are adjacent to the existing car park and more distantly interface the Sydney Building. Until the car park site is redeveloped this aspect will be highly prominent from London Circuit. It is noted that Image 1 was captured prior to upgrade works commencing at this intersection and that the verges will be upgraded as part of these current works. Upon completion of works, the view upon the site will be of a similar nature.
- The south-west frontages of the site interface Vernon Circle. Presentation of future built form along this aspect is highlighted to be of primary importance noting the significance of Northbourne Avenue as the Main Approach Route (in accordance with the NCP) and the future intended character of Vernon Circle.
- The existing volumes of the Canberra Theatre and Playhouse are noted for visual prominence from Vernon Circle, with lower scale built form creating a base for these elements.





















1.5 Topography - Site

The site features a steady slope from the southeast to north-west with a steep bermed area at the south between Vernon Circle and Theatre Lane.

There is approximately a 3 metre fall from Northbourne Avenue to Knowles Place with the footpaths around the site offering a consistent gradient for ease of use by pedestrians.

Due to the current topographic conditions, the opportunity to reflect broader scale natural systems (i.e. water story) is identified along the interface between the subject site and the existing car park.







1.8 Future Development Context


The future development context is driven by objectives in the National Capital Plan that reinforces the City Hill Precinct as the municipal heart of central Canberra.

2.1 Canberra Civic and Cultural District

2.1.1 Current

The Canberra Civic and Cultural District (CCCD) is currently home to key civic organisations, including performing arts, library, museum, gallery and parliamentary uses.

Development of the **Canberra Lyric Theatre** is considered to be the cornerstone project of the evolving precinct, with recent redevelopment of 220 London Circuit and Constitution Place under construction, the new Theatre celebrates activation and cultural enrichment opportunities offered to the city through regeneration of this precinct.

2.1 Canberra Civic and Cultural District

2.1.2 Draft Concept Master Plan

The future vision for the CCCD will be captured by the Concept Master Plan. This document is currently under development by the City Renewal Authority and is understood to hold intentions for reinforcing the precinct as a core cultural hub within its civic context.

Outcomes of the Canberra Lyric Theatre should be further coordinated with the draft Concept Master Plan as it is developed to ensure overall functionality of the precinct can be realised. The Concept Master Plan's aims are observed to promote strong amenity outcomes for the public realm (e.g. pedestrian links, public plazas/ forecourts, awnings and shelters, etc.) as the precinct develops.



Proposed Vehicular Drop-off for Canberra Lyric Theatre







2.3 Movement Strategy

2.4 Project Staging Considerations

The current scope of work for this Works Approval is for the Canberra Lyric Theatre.

Any other stages/development works are not within the scope of this Works Approval.

The design team acknowledges that the Canberra Civic and Cultural District (CCCD) is an evolving precinct within central Canberra. With the recent completion of Constitution Place, the KPMG Building and One Constitution (currently under construction), the Canberra Lyric Theatre will be the cornerstone project of the Canberra Theatre Centre, setting the scene for future revitalisation works within the broader precinct.

Acknowledging the early design phase of the master planning works, the Canberra Lyric Theatre has been developed with consideration towards the future urban structure of the precinct. The design team appreciates that future development stages will enhance and further support the functionality of the theatre as it integrates cohesively with the development intentions of the public realm.

The design team understands that the overall functionality of the precinct may not be realised upon completion of the Canberra Lyric Theatre and highlights the following considerations/assumptions:

01. Car Parking

The design anticipates the use of the existing surface car park located to the north of the site for nearby patron and staff car parking. In the future, the design team understands that a public basement car park will be included in the redevelopment of Block 23 to the north, with a direct underground link provided in the design to facilitate a direct, accessible pedestrian connection to the foyer. The design team acknowledges that a provision for nearby parking to the Canberra Lyric Theatre may require consideration during the construction phase of redevelopment at Block 23.

02. Vehicle Drop off

Vehicle drop is assumed to be retained as per the existing arrangement, i.e. along London Circuit and an additional drop-off point to be provided within the surface car park to the north. The design team understands that a vehicle drop-off will be provided in the basement car park of Block 23 upon its redevelopment.

03. Pedestrian Connectivity

As the City Hill precinct develops, the design team anticipates that an accessible pedestrian connection will be provided over Theatre Lane to Vernon Circle to further enhance accessibility and active travel outcomes across the site.

04. Loading and serviceability

The design team acknowledges that any future built form encroaching above Theatre Lane may limit the capacity for high-clearance vehicles and considers that a provision for loading of these vehicles may be required for optimal serviceability of Canberra Lyric Theatre and Playhouse in future.

In addition, the design team acknowledges the proximity of the Canberra Museum & Gallery (CMAG) loading zone to the Canberra Lyric Theatre and suggests that a management strategy is considered noting the increased pedestrian movement in this zone to mitigate this potential conflict of use.

3.1 Canberra Lyric Theatre - Design Statement

The Canberra Lyric Theatre announces itself within the city's cultural heart as a sculpted terracing form. Embracing Vernon Circle, the building reinforces the legibility of the CCCD and the desired outcomes of the City Hill Precinct through carefully carved massing and built form elements.

The lower terraces create an elegant base that respond politely to neighbouring development. The auditorium and fly tower then rise proudly from this plane to present these elements as urban markers within the city's built form landscape.

There are three main entries to the building. Two of which, East Foyer Entry and Stage Door, are oriented towards Knowles Place and the future Lyric Plaza. Connecting these entries with a welcoming, northerly forecourt promotes activation in the public realm and anchors the building within its master planned context. The third, West Foyer Entry, engages with Northbourne Avenue, providing ease of connectivity with major public transport routes and celebrates the character of the Main Avenue Approach Route.

The façade reads as a vertical tapestry of shadow and light—layered planes, slender fins, and translucent veils respond to the rhythms of the day. Glimpses through the screen catch sight of Black Mountain; reflections shimmer along Vernon Circle. The architecture becomes a living curtain—filtering, framing, and performing—a lyrical expression of culture and place.

A seamless back-of-house strategy discreetly tucks a shared loading dock between the Lyric and Playhouse, erasing the need for vehicle access off Northbourne and reinforcing a calm, uninterrupted urban edge.

The sculptural form of the auditorium is compressed—stepped terraces of 1,000seat stalls, 500-seat circle, and 500-seat balcony stack within a lowered volume, intensifying intimacy while reducing vertical scale.


3.2 Designing with Country

3.2.1 Collaborative Design Methodology with Yerrabingin

The Canberra Lyric Theatre will be shaped through a Country-focused, collaborative design methodology developed in partnership with Yerrabingin. This methodology combines principles of design thinking and user-centred design with a deep commitment to Country.

The process will unfold across four cyclical stages based on Yerrabingin's design methodology: Collect, Plant, Nourish, and Tend. In the Collect stage, involves listening deeply—walking the site, gathering stories, and engaging with Traditional Custodians, Elders, and community members to understand the cultural, ecological, and spatial narratives of the place. In the Plant stage, co-facilitation of design workshops bringing together First Nations voices and the broader project team to generate grounded, innovative responses will be involved. Nourish will facilitate refinement and iterating design outcomes in response to feedback—testing how these insights could meaningfully inform form, materiality, sequence, and experience. Finally, Tend will be the ongoing commitment: to ensure the relationships built through this process are sustained and that the design continues to support cultural expression, stewardship, and intergenerational knowledge-sharing.

3.2.2 Community Feedback Process

Grounded in dialogue, workshops, and site visits, community voices have directly informed key principles—a shared authorship—where Elders, knowledge holders, and designers come together to weave Country into every material, space, and gesture. The result is a design that listens as much as it speaks, honouring both the place and the people who care for it.

The co-design process through a series of inperson workshops at the site in June 2025, brought together over 30 Aboriginal community members alongside Infrastructure Canberra, Multiplex, COX Architecture, Charcoal Blue, and Yerrabingin. Key themes emerged through the sessions, including the importance of topography, local geology, and waterways; the sensory experience of Country through light, sound, scent, and texture; and the need for spaces that support storytelling, gathering, and education. The feedback reinforced the building's role not only as a performance space, but as a living cultural vessel—one that honours Country, connects people across generations, and reflects the stories, textures, and spirit of place.

3.2.3 Principles & Pillars

Rooted in deep listening and First Nation's community input, in consultation with Yerrabingin, design pillars and principles make space for the architecture to become a living, breathing extension of Country, where performance is not separate from Country, but held within it.





The journey through the building is grounded in Canberra's distinct topography and ecology in its surrounding landscape—Brindabella Ranges, Black Mountain, Mount Ainslie, Namadji, Birrigai. Each landform condition is rich with story and meaning, offering a canvas for expression by local First Nations voices.

Drawing from the geology stratification beneath and the ecologies above, colours, textures, and movements of keystone species are integrated into the spatial experience, echoing the terrain layered, living, and responsive.

Transitioning from the grassy plains of the Monaro and wide geological outcrops, one is gathered into the foyer, travelling along ridgelines with large areas to host people within sheltered landscapes. Light permeates halfway up the tree and snow gums are banded with the transitions of light, colour and the seasons. The transition into the auditorium is like stepping into a clearing, sitting in it amongst the grass, held within it, with the stage as fire.

3.2.4 Of Place - Topography and Geology




Layered geology reinforcing Canberra's bedrock character of deep time - ruptured, stratified, assembled like geological matter.

The building presents itself as a sculptural ensemble of rock-like forms, reminiscent of the mountainous topography of the context, thoughtfully arranged in a dynamic interplay of solid volumes and open voids. The envelope will evoke the texture of a faceted stone, drawing the rippling of wind, dappled light through glass in to reflect natural layers of erosion over deep time.

Earlier geological strata — Camp Hill Quartz, Black Mountain Sandstone, and State Circle Shale — form the buried foundations of Canberra and echo through its built forms. Limestone outcrops along the Molonglo River and the Birrigai Rock Shelter, one of the oldest sites of human occupation in the region, anchor the city to a deep temporal horizon where stone and story interlace. Beyond the basin, the granite tors of Namadgi National Park rise as monumental outcrops, weathered yet enduring, shaping both horizon and memory.


The façade draws on these rocky precedents: its textures reference the fractured faces of quartz and sandstone; its layers mirror the stratification of shale; its solidity recalls the limestone outcrops and granite tors. The building becomes a contemporary outcrop — both a cultural shelter and a geological marker —grounded in Canberra's deep time and enduring landscape.























3.2.5 Design Narrative - Transform and Ascent





The main stair and skylight act as a ceremonial spine for the building, drawing visitors upward in a sequence. The stair is framed and illuminated by the skylight, which pours daylight deep into the interior and traces the rhythm of ascent. Moving upward becomes a journey of transformation, each landing a pause in the narrative, each step guided by light as if moving toward revelation.

As visitors climb, orientation is reinforced by framed outlooks—moments where the architecture opens to the wider landscape. Long, deliberate views reach outward to Black Mountain, Mount Ainslie, and the Brindabellas, embedding the building in its topography and memory. These sightlines root the journey in Country: Black Mountain as a green anchor of the city, Mount Ainslie as a ceremonial vantage, the Brindabellas as a shifting backdrop of distance and weather. The stair thus becomes a line of dialogue between interior transformation and exterior orientation, binding personal movement to collective geography.

3.2.6 Immersed in Country

The arrival experience for the theatre patron is orchestrated as a slow processional ascent from the east entry to the auditorium seat. This movement enhances and echoes the transformative power of theatre in taking one away from the mundane day-to-day, to the theatrical world of fantasy.

As one traverses east to west, an elongated framed view is formed towards the main foyer stair and sky beyond. The volume of the building opens from initial compression at the lower ground entry, then progression through a double, then triple height void.


An ascent occurs from lower ground to ground level mimicking the striations of Canberra geology, and finally via a generous steel foyer stair coloured to reflect the stone hues of that geology.

The north façade is serrated in form, consisting of solid and glazed elements orienting the patrons view westward.

As one ascends the main stair, a pause at the top of each flight gives a moment of connection for the patron to orient oneself within the City - via a vista over Northbourne Avenue and City Hill; connect oneself to Country – via a broad unencumbered vista towards the horizon line of the Brindabellas and Black Mountain.

A vista to Sky Country is ever present through a triangulated oculus positioned over the main stair in a triangulated foyer space foregrounding the auditorium.

On turning towards the auditorium, a sense of orchestrated anticipation is built by a processional architecture, the patron enters the world of the theatre, transformed.

Circularity

The **Building Circularity Potential** represents the total material circularity of the in-use materials for the project as well as end-of-life handling. It is calculated as the average of circular material inputs and materials outputs. The calculation is mass-based.


Given the large amount of concrete mass in the project, renewable and recycled material inputs will need to be prioritised, as well as down-cycling of concrete to aggregate at the end-of-life stage.


5.1 Connections + Constraints














5.3 Concept Landscape Plan

The landscape concept is founded in numerous design studies and with consideration to a broad array of stakeholder inputs and design drivers. Studies into thermal and solar comfort, anticipated pedestrian movements, flexible event space, breakout and activation, universal accessibility and, in particular, adjacent future interfaces have been considered to create spatial structure and diversity in the public realm delivery.

The public realm delivery along the northern architectural façade, which we've temporarily labelled as Limelight Lane for the purpose of creating an identity, integrates carefully placed landscape planting beds to assist with achieving grading functions, particularly from the western foyer and northern façade egress. A landscape kit of parts along the length of the northern façade aids to conceal level differences between the glazing line and the grading of the public domain. The eastern portion of Limelight Lane is predominantly flat and comprises movable planter/furniture elements to allow temporary event and external performances to occur adjacent a raised bench.


Other features of the landscape design include a breakout space to the western interface with seating and native landscape buffering to Northbourne Avenue. The Eastern façade is predominantly hardstand to serve function aspect of the primary foyer space and stage door access. The existing verge path connecting Northbourne Ave and Vernon Circle will be retained and/or reinstated cognisant of future condition/alignment of these roads pending agreement. All spaces are intended to be linked with a consistent hardscape and materials palette, however with final patterning, selections, and treatments subject to final confirmation in collaboration with other concurrent works within the Canberra Civic and Cultural District.

The approach along the Vernon Circle interface is to screen the loading dock wall with a combination of native vegetation buffer and a climber growing against the all. With Street trees shown as Japanese Elms to match the installation/approval of other recent works associated with S100 and S19 works approval submissions. Other than this, the intent is to create landscape character zones through a diverse native species palette.

5.4 Universal Accessibility Strategy



The level changes around the Architectural façade have been a key driver for the spatial configuration of the public domain. The intent is to create broad, relatively flat, areas external to the primary entries and ensure paths of travel from egress points are intuitive and unobstructed.

From the western foyer entry the public domain grades down at maximum walkway (1:20 max.), without the need to introduce ramp infrastructure (tactiles and handrails). The purpose of this is to maximise the usable crossgrade compliant plaza space to the eastern portion of Limelight Lane which is intended to align with future public/private plazas of Lyric Plaza and the future Block 23. Interfaces between existing and future conditions to these plazas and Knowles place are subject to ongoing confirmation and the respective designs are developed.

A length of maximum 1:20 path is provided to balance the level change between the western façade and the existing Vernon Circle verge path levels, with the existing verge path access being retained.

Other landscape features including lighting, signage and other wayfinding are shown indicatively in the landscape concept, but are subject to future detailed Works Approval consideration.
