



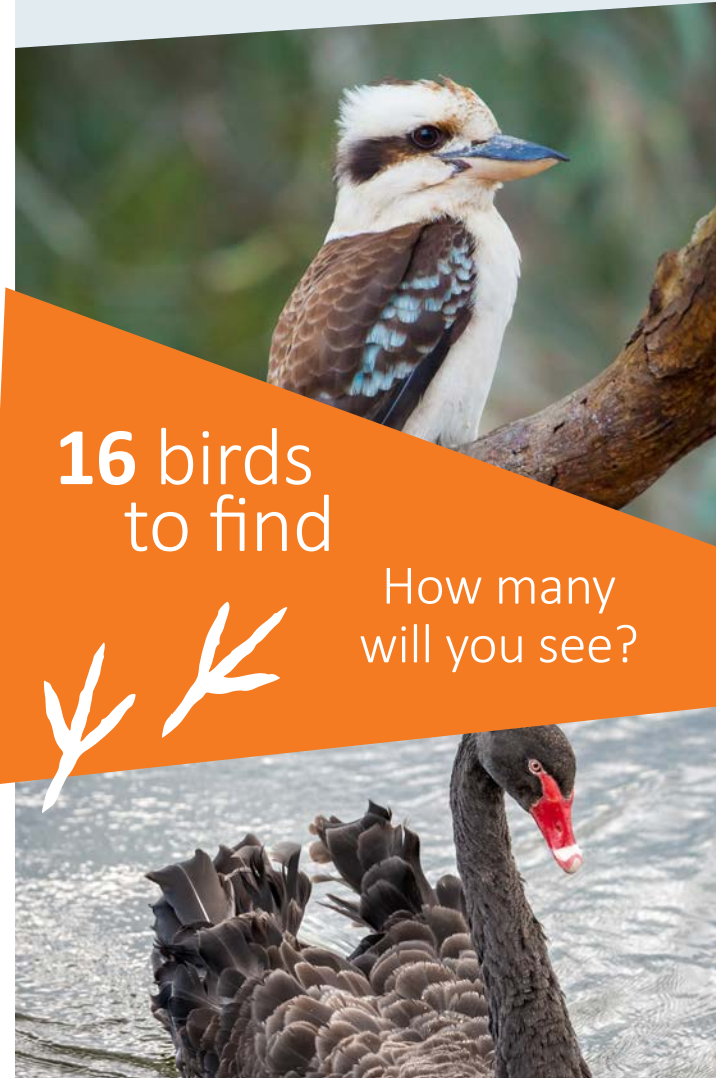
Looking for a fun family activity in the school holidays? Like an adventure?

- 4. Some say I am a superb little blue bird.
- 5. I'm known to sit in the old gum tree and am king of the bush.
- 6. Not major but minor with a striking yellow beak.
- 7. You will find me by the water with an extensive wing span and long neck.
- 8. I eat soft shoots of reeds. I'm a hen with deep blue feathers and a red beak that lives in a swamp.

- 9. My breast feathers are rose coloured. You will find me feeding on grass seeds on the ground.
- 10. I'm a long way from the ocean with a bill that holds more than my belly.
- 11. Careful, I might swoop you off your feet in spring. I am the mascot for an Australian football team.
- 12. I have a tail to wag but am not a dog. An active feeder, I'm often seen darting around.
- 13. Omnivorous by nature, my beak, mouth and plumage is all black.
- 14. Well known for my loud screech, I have snow white feathers and lemon crest.

- 16. My feathers are grey and fluffy. Some may say I'm an ugly duckling.

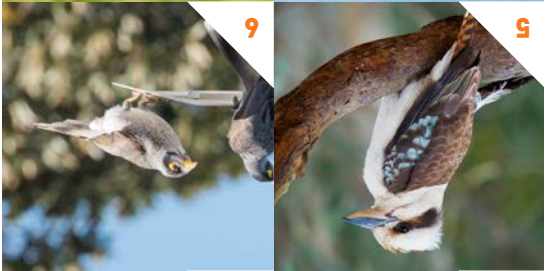

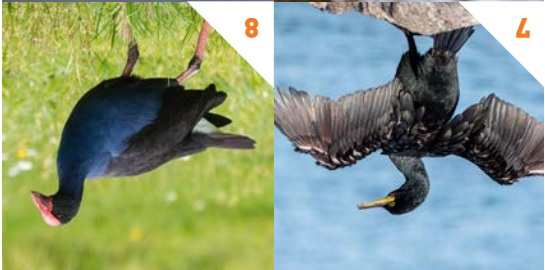
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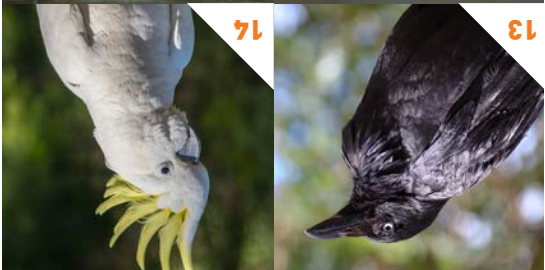
