Statement of Reasons for decision to approve Early Works associated with the AWM Redevelopment - Block 3 Section 39 Campbell

I, Andrew Smith, being an employee of the National Capital Authority (NCA) and holding delegation from the Authority to approve works under section 12(1)(b) of the *Australian Capital Territory* (*Planning and Land Management*) *Act 1988* (the PALM Act), provide the following statement of reasons for my decision to approve the early works (consisting of hoarding, service relocation, demolition and excavation) associated with the Australian War Memorial (AWM) redevelopment within Block 3 Section 39 Campbell (the Early Works).

This statement is provided in response to requests made pursuant to section 13 of the *Administrative Decisions (Judicial Review) Act 1977*. This statement sets out the background, my findings of facts, a reference to the evidence or other material on which my findings were based and the reasons for my decision. In providing this statement of reasons it is not accepted that any requester is entitled to a statement of reasons pursuant to section 13 of the *Administrative Decisions (Judicial Review) Act 1977*.

LEGISLATION

Sections 10, 11 and 12 of the PALM Act are relevant to the consideration of the application for works approval. Section 10 outlines the matters covered by the National Capital Plan (the Plan) and provides as follows:

(1) The Plan may specify areas of land that have the special characteristics of the National Capital to be Designated Areas.

Section 11(2) requires that the Authority not do any act that is inconsistent with the Plan.

Section 12 of the PALM Act provides as follows:

- (1) No works shall be performed in a Designated Area unless:
 - (a) the proposal to perform the works has been submitted to the Authority together with such plans and specifications as are required by the Authority;
 - (b) the Authority has approved the works in writing; and
 - (c) the works are in accordance with the Plan.

The subject site is located within a Designated Area under the Plan. Works approval under section 12 was therefore required before any works could be undertaken.

BACKGROUND

The process for consideration of works approval generally includes a number of steps. These are:

- Pre-lodgement discussions on preliminary drawings
- Pre-lodgement design presentations
- Application submitted by the applicant.

- NCA may request further information on the application.
- Public Consultation on the proposed works (as described the NCA's Commitment to Community Engagement).
- NCA may request further information as a result of submissions received during consultation.
- NCA delegate makes a determination on the application against the provisions of the Plan.
- The applicant and submitters are advised of the decision.

APPLICATION FOR WORKS APPROVAL WA102272

The AWM is a nationally significant memorial containing a shrine, museum and archive. It is listed on the Commonwealth and National Heritage lists under the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999*.

On 12 March 2021, an application for works approval was received by the NCA from Knight Frank Town Planning. The application is for early works associated with a broader AWM Redevelopment located at Block 3 Section 39 Campbell. The applicant states the AWM Redevelopment will address the following matters:

- Spatial constraints that prevent:
 - the telling of the stories of recent conflicts and operations at a level of detail consistent with earlier conflicts, and
 - the AWM properly recognising the service of those who served in recent conflicts and operations;
- The lack of capacity to include large technology objects such as planes, helicopters and armoured vehicles within galleries, as these objects are critical to telling the stories of recent conflicts and operations;
- Circulation challenges caused by the numbers of visitors being well in excess of what the building was designed for, and which has now been in excess of one million per year for the last five years; and
- The lack of compliance with the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992*, to ensure the facility is accessible for everyone, regardless of physical capacity.

The current application is concerned only with the proposed early works, as described below. Any further works in the proposed the AWM Redevelopment will be subject to separate future applications for works approval.

THE SITE

The subject site (Block 3 Section 39 Campbell) is Unleased National Land located within a Designated Area (Figure 70 - Constitution Avenue and Anzac Parade). The site is located at 20 Treloar Crescent, Campbell and bounded by Limestone Avenue, Fairbairn Avenue and Treloar Crescent. The permitted land use for the site within the National Capital Plan is National Capital Use.

The AWM is listed on the National and Commonwealth Heritage lists under the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999* and is also included in the Register of the National Estate.

The works within each package are:

• Early Works Package 1:

- <u>Project Perimeter Hoardings</u> to the Southern Entrance, Bean Building and Anzac Hall Works Sites. The hoardings will ensure staff, visitors and the public are separated from the work sites.
 - Main Southern Hoarding: Installation of a 6-metre height x 52m width hoarding to be installed along the southern perimeter and be visible from Anzac Parade. In pre-WA discussions between the AWM and NCA it was agreed the hoardings along with Southern perimeter will be plain cream mesh cover with a section of graphics that features an artist's impression of the future Southern Entrance.
 - Bean Building, Anzac Hall work sites: to include H1 and H2 hoarding design: this contains a blue background with graphics, the maximum length of graphics is 30m and is separated by 30m length plain blue (the hoarding design is identical to that approved already by the NCA as part of various enabling works applications).

o Southern Entrance Site Early Works:

- Installation of tree protection measures (in accordance with AS4970:2009 Protection of Trees on Development Sites) for the trees adjacent to the works area.
- Demolition of forecourt planters.
- Level 1 plant room and vents to be de-commissioned.
- Eastern Precinct carpark plant room to be demolished.
- Pedestrian ramp to carpark to be demolished. Batter to carpark edge in accordance with Civil Engineer's detail.
- Demolition of bitumen road and footpaths.
- Removal of Parade Ground gravel and turf.
- Demolition of existing pathways.
- Removal of all metalwork, including handrails, balustrades and bollards.
- Existing flood lights are to be retained and protected.

o Stonework Removal

- Removal of Main Entry stair and plinths stonework (to be stored for reinstatement).
- Removal of the stonework to the existing heritage retaining wall (north-west of the forecourt, to be stored for reinstatement).
- Removal of Christmas Bush granite paving / sandstone paving / Parade Ground sandstone retaining walls (to be stored for re-use).
- Any Stonework dismantling is to be undertaken by a heritage masonry specialist consultant. This will ensure quality control measures are implemented (e.g. accurate identification, cataloguing, tagging, handling, storage, repair, and re-laying methods).

o Services Relocation

 Works associated with services relocations, redirections and upgrades are to be undertaken in accordance with the Civil Engineer's drawings and specifications.

Civil Works and Bulk Excavation

- Works associated with bulk excavation, including battering, and shoring to civil and structural engineer's details.
- Local re-grading to proposed pathways and Parade Ground terraces.
- Installation of Central Energy Plant services culvert.
- Installation of the north and south services culverts on East Road.
- Installation of a new roundabout at the Poppy's Carpark entry road.
- TCCS Authorisation of Temporary Traffic Management (TM/8026) will be in place along Limestone Avenue and Fairbairn Avenue.

• Early Works Package 2: Services Relocation and Ancillary Works

- Services capping to Anzac Hall to enable demolition.
- o Service relocations from Treloar Crescent.
- o Service relocations from Bean Building and Poppy's Café.
- o Service relocations to the New Southern Entrance.
- New Bean Building timber workshop entry and path to enable staff access during construction.

• Early Works Package 3: Demolition of Anzac Hall

- o Installation of 2.1m height solid project hoardings around the site including graphics.
- o Demolition of Anzac Hall building.
- Demolition of Link Bridge connecting to the Main Building.
- o Demolition of embedded structure and services.
- o Demolition of hardstand and stairs.
- o Removal of 11 trees along southern verge of Treloar Crescent.
- All relocations of existing external services adjacent to Anzac Hall will be completed to allow excavation works to be undertaken.
- Soil Nail Walls (SNW) to be constructed around the full perimeter of the Anzac Hall Lower Gallery, matching the extent of the bulk earthworks excavation documented by TTW Civil. Soil Nail lengths vary between 3.0m and 11.0m and wall thickness is typically 150mm.
- Sections of the SNW are designed to cantilever above existing ground level to allow for the retention of proposed landscaping and will be formed up above ground.
- Demolition works will not impact on the Main Building. The Brisbane Bridge and Gun will be protected while works are underway.

• Early Works Package 4: Civil Works and Bulk Excavation

- New Southern Entrance sandstone and granite removal for storage and reuse.
- o New Southern Entrance and Parade Ground excavation.
- East Road north and south culverts.
- o Anzac Hall bulk excavation and soil nails.
- Bean Building Extension and Central Energy Plant bulk excavation.
- o Minor demolition works of existing precast walls and moat.
- o Central Energy Plant culvert installation.

Bean Building Early Works

- o Installation of a site perimeter hoarding containing graphics enclosing the works area of the Bean Building.
- Underground water mains, gas lines, sewer lines, fire services, chillers and high and low voltage conduits will be relocated to enable bulk excavation.
- o Relocation of chillers servicing Bean Building and Poppy's Café.

- o Removal of concrete retaining walls and footings, the moat wall, the timber workshop entry, and the path from the stair and loading apron slab.
- o A new opening will be created in the outer northern precast concrete wall in the location of a future door.
- o Parts of the landscape surrounding the Bean Building: including part of the northern carpark, fences, trees, pavement, pathways, and steps will be removed.
- Bulk excavation will include the excavation of culverts north of the Bean Building to facilitate the construction of the Central Energy Plan.
- Soil-nail walls will be constructed inside the excavated areas to facilitate future construction of foundations and to provide structural containment for the excavated walls
- o Installation of a north and a south services culvert in East Road.
- A portion of East Road will be removed to allow for the installation of culverts and a temporary road surface will be established prior to the permanent reinstatement (to form part of the Main Works Package). The temporary surface will facilitate the movement of heavy construction vehicles for the duration of the project without damaging hardstand, verges, and other ground infrastructure.
- No floor area is to be demolished at the Bean Building.

Prior NCA and external approvals

In making my decision, I have had regard to the following approvals made prior to the application made to the NCA:

Previous NCA works approvals

I have had regard to previous NCA approvals of associated enabling works for the AWM Redevelopment. Relevantly, the NCA has previously approved several earlier projects and preparatory works as part of the AWM Redevelopment. These include new car parking, asbestos removal and temporary structures currently used for display, office purposes or site compounds. A list of previous approved works associated with the AWM Redevelopment is attached at **Attachment A.**

Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Approval

Part 2.4.4 (a) of the National Capital Plan states that the National Capital Authority will consider heritage places in Designated Areas for purposes of protecting the environment in a manner currently afforded under the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act (1999)* (EPBC Act) and any subsequent legislation.

In November 2019, the AWM referred the proposal to the Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment (DAWE) for its assessment under the provisions of the EPBC Act. On 10 December 2020, the Minister for the Environment approved the proposal with conditions.

Minister Leys' assessment and approval of the proposal (as subsequently varied by the Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment) considered and addressed all relevant heritage matters.

Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works

The Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works assessed the Redevelopment project and on 22 February 2021, the Committee recommended that the House of Representatives resolve that it is expedient to carry out the Australian War Memorial Development Project, pursuant to s 18(7) of the *Public Works Committee Act 1969*.

This adoption of the recommendation by Parliament appears in the House of Representatives Hansard on Thursday, 25 February 2021.

MATERIAL CONSIDERED

In making my decision on the works approval application for the proposed early works associated with the AWM Redevelopment, including hoardings, service relocation, demolition and excavation at Block 3 Section 39 Campbell, I had regard to:

- 1. the National Capital Plan and the relevant provisions therein;
- 2. the material submitted with the works approval application, including reports and design iterations submitted by the applicant (Knight Frank Town Planning, on behalf of the AWM);
- the submissions received during consultation and the Consultation Report dated June 2021 prepared by the NCA;
- 4. the Delegate Report prepared by qualified planning officers;
- 5. the Parliament House Vista Heritage Management Plan (2010);
- 6. the Australian War Memorial Heritage Management Plan (2011);
- 7. the Australian War Memorial Site Development Plan (2016);
- 8. the previous NCA approvals and external approvals;
- advice provided by the ACT Government (Transport Canberra and City Services) regarding
 Temporary Traffic Management;
- 10. a Tree Management Plan & Tree Protection Measures prepared by Canopy Tree Experts dated 4 March 2021 which covers 16 trees (outlined in **Attachment B**);
- 11. the advice provided by the arborist (Canopy Tree Experts) dated 26 May 2021 (further outlined in **Attachment B**);
- 12. the Ecological Impact Assessment prepared by Capital Ecology dated 5 March 2021;
- 13. the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Approval decision made by the Minister for the Environment dated 10 December 2020; and
- 14. Variation of Conditions of EPBC approval (EPBC 2019/8579) dated 27 May 2021.

FINDINGS OF FACT

Planning Considerations (National Capital Plan)

Land Use

The proposed works are located within Urban Areas as shown in *Figure 2: General Policy Plan – Metropolitan Canberra*, of the NCP and the Constitution Avenue and Anzac Parade Precinct of the Central National Area.

The land use policy for this site is **National Capital Use**. Appendix A 'Land Use Definitions' of the National Capital Plan defines the term 'National Capital Use' as:

"The use of any land, building or structure for the purpose of a work of special status and national interest. This includes the National Library, the National Gallery, the High Court, the National Archives, the National Museum of Australia, the <u>Australian War Memorial</u>, the Prime Minister's Residence, the Governor-General's Residence, the Australian National University, the Australian National Botanic Gardens, Commonwealth Offices needing prestigious locations, national memorials, National Association Offices as herein defined, a hospitality house or a Commonwealth Government conference centre and the like."

(Emphasis added).

As such, the proposed works will not alter the land use policy for the site. I find that the proposed works are not inconsistent with the Plan's land use policy for the site.

Assessment of Works

I set out in the tables below my findings of fact relevant to my assessment that the proposed works are in accordance with the Plan and my decision to grants works approval.

Part 2.2 Productivity (Infrastructure and Employment)

Ensure that infrastructure supports the development of Canberra's National Capital functions.

Part 2.3 Sustainability (Environmental Sustainability and Open Space)

Objective one — Ensure the development of a city that both respects environmental values and reflects national concerns with the sustainability of Australia's urban areas.

Objective two - Protect the nationally significant open-space network, visual backdrop and landscape setting of the National Capital.

"No Significant Plants and Animals are mapped within the study area of the ACT Government's ACTmapi online mapping tool." However, there are threatened species and potential threatened woodland areas in proximity of the AWM.

The study area contains one plant community type namely 'ACT 16 — Eucalyptus melliodora — Eucalyptus blakelyi Tableland Grass Woodland.

The study area has been used as the site for the Australian War Memorial since the early 1940's. As a result, the vegetation which occurs today is highly modified. The majority of the study area has been cleared, intensively landscape and regularly mown over a long period of time. The remnant overstorey is largely absent and the native midstorey and shrub storey have been entirely removed. The ground storey is heavily modified and dominated by a variety of exotic lawn grasses and common weeds. The few native non-grass species present in the study area are primarily non-local native species of various provenance, all of which have been planted for landscaping purposes.

Given that the study area is currently a manicured landscape and is heavily frequented by the public, it is unlikely that it constitutes a significant component of a wildlife movement corridor or is otherwise of high importance for fauna habitat connectivity. This is evident as the majority of the study area is not identified as a 'Local Link' or as possessing 'Regional Linkage Value' on ACTmapi.

Of the 154 trees assessed, only five contain a functional hollow and therefore support a potential nesting / roosting habitat resource to hollow-dependant fauna."

The AWM advised that excavated matrial will be temporarily stored off-site for reuse.

Construction and material laydown areas are to be sited in existing cleared areas and not within existing vegetated areas.

Taking into account the above, I find that the Early Works adequately protects and supports any ecological communities, threatened flora and fauna species, water catchments and water quality, where applicable.

e) Development will respect environmental values including water catchments and water quality and ensure resilience to the impacts of climate change.

Not inconsistent with the Plan.

	Erosion and sediment control plans for the Early Works contain measures that will be in place to minimise impacts on the hydrological catchment. These measures include installation of siltation fences, geotextile fabric around stormwater pits, sandbag sediment trap, hay bale barriers and turf lined swales.
	There are no natural watercourses with the Project site. A man-made drainage channel runs from the north – western corner of the site to the southeastern corner, approximately 40m north of the Project site. There is very low potential for disturbed earth to wash into the drainage channel as it is located uphill from the Project site.
	Having regard to the above, I find the Early Works will respect environmental values.

The current application does not include new landscaping. The applicant has submitted a Tree Removal and Replacement Plan which includes proposed planting of at least 250 native trees. The proposed tree planting will form part of a separate works application for the public realm areas to be submitted to the NCA in April 2022 (tree planting would occur after the Early Works phase of the AWM Redevelopment). Consistency will be achieved once the new tree planting is established. The Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment (DAWE) assessed the proposed works in accordance with the EPBC Act, and on 10 December 2020, the Minister for the Environment, Sussan Ley approved the proposal with conditions.

The approval by Minister Ley satisfies the heritage conditions of the Plan and has guided my assessment of this application.

b) Within Designated Areas, the National Capital Authority may require Heritage (or Conservation) Management Plans to accompany development applications for heritage places which should be prepared to meet requirements equivalent to those in the EPBC Act. Not inconsistent with the Plan.

In concluding that the Early Works meets the requirements equivalent to those in the EPBC Act, I took into account the Heritage Impact Statement (HIS), prepared by Hector Abrahams Architect (dated September 2020) which was submitted with the application for Early Works. The HIS is silent on the proposed tree removal and impacts on the landscape. In relation to the demolition of Anzac Hall the HIS concludes:

"The loss of the existing ANZAC Hall is a sole significant loss of value and has a substantial negative impact on the heritage significance of the place..."

"The demolition of Anzac Hall is the most detrimental aspect of the proposal, representing the loss of fabric of aesthetic significance."

In relation to demolition of the rear plant enclosure, the HIS concludes:

"The demolition of the plant enclosure at the rear of the site, including part of its wall, removes an intrusive element from the site. This will improve the appreciation of the symmetrical original main building from the east at the rear, and will remove the noise generated by the plant, which at present as the effect of disturbs the contemplative character of external space in the Eastern Precinct."

In relation to the broader demolition works, the HIS concludes:

"Demolition is required for the development to proceed."

Temporary traffic management (TM/8026) will be in place along Fairbairn Avenue and Limestone Avenue for the duration of works.

Contractor parking (115 car spaces) will be provided on site within the designated temporary carpark above Poppy's Carpark.

Part 3.3 - Urban Areas

The AWM is located within Urban Areas under Figure 2 – General Policy Plan. The land use for the AWM is 'National Capital Use'. National Capital Use is a permitted land use in Urban Areas.

Part 4.1 - The Central National Area

The Constitution Avenue and Anzac Parade Precinct is located within the Central National Area.

Part 4.1.1 General policies for the Central National Area

- (1) Protect the Griffins' vision by:
- (c) "recognising that some elements (for example the Australian War Memorial and Parliament House) are successful reinterpretations of the 1918 Griffin Plan which are consistent with and strengthen the framework and spirt of the Plan."
- 2) Building on the Griffins' vision by:
- (j) maintaining a mix of tree species which enriches the landscape by providing beauty, shade, shelter and wildlife habitats and enhances the built environment."

The removal of 140 trees in the current application would appear inconsistent with (4.1(2)(j) in the medium term. The AWM has provided a Tree Removal and Replacement Plan that demonstrates replacement tree planting is intended as part of the Public Realm works application. A total of 246 native trees are proposed. The proposed future tree planting will offset the impacts of the tree removal contained in the current application and there will be no inconsistency once the proposed future tree plantings reach maturity. In advising the AWM of my works approval decision I have made clear that the future application for works approval for future tree plantings is expected to cover a minimum of 250 native trees of specified advanced stock. Any future works approval can ensure advanced stock specified tree plantings appropriate to the site consistent with 4.1(2)(j).

Part 4.8 - Constitution Avenue and Anzac Parade Precinct Code

The Constitution Avenue and Anzac Parade Precinct comprises the land between Constitution Avenue and Parkes Way, the Russell apex of the National Triangle, Anzac Parade and the Australian War Memorial. Anzac Parade is set along the Land Axis, which forms a key feature of the Griffins' original 1912 plan of the city. The Australian War Memorial stands at the top end of Anzac Parade. The two together are central to the commemoration of Australian military service and sacrifice.

Key objectives of the Precinct Code include: developing a built environment which demonstrates design excellence and environmentally sustainable development. The relevant detailed conditions of planning, design and development contained in Part 4.8.5 are included in the table below.

The Australian War Memorial is listed on the Commonwealth and National Heritage lists under the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999*.

The Australian War Memorial Heritage Management Plan 2011

The Australian War Memorial Heritage Management Plan (HMP) was prepared by Godden Mackay Logan in 2011. The HMP provides a guide for conserving, managing, and interpreting the Australian War Memorial's site heritage. The following policies apply to the proposal:

Australian War Memorial Site Development Plan 2016

The Australian War Memorial Site Development Plan was prepared by Johnson Pilton Walker. The Site Development Plan covers key principles including: site context, Precincts (Main Memorial Building, Eastern Precinct, Western Precinct and Parade Ground), Landscape, Circulation, Security, Future Building Development Sites, Memorial Placement Principles, Lighting, Signage and Furniture.

The relevant Site Development Principles are included below:

Future Building Development
-Extension to the existing Bean Building

-South-Western Landscape Development

Numerous existing trees in the south-western site area have been assessed as approaching senescence or with undesirable conditions such as merged crowns. The long term nature of tree growth means that a detailed long term strategy for managing a gradual process of new plantings and removals of appropriate trees should be developed within a framework of the broader strategy for the landscape and placement of memorials.

-Western Precinct

Planting strategy

A detailed Tree Assessment Report (DBS, 2007) is used for the management of the existing trees. Numerous trees have been identified to be approaching senescence or having other major problems. These may be gradually removed in coordination with plans for future plantings.

As part of considering the application, I was aware of and have had regard to the Australian War Memorial Site Development Plan 2016. I note that the siting of the buildings was informed by the site development principles contained within this plan.

Public consultation

As part of making my decision, I have taken into account the responses received by the AWM during its consultation processes and responses received by the NCA during its consultation processes.

AWM Pre-Application Consultation

Prior to lodging the Early Works application with the NCA, the AWM undertook two separate consultation processes on the proposed Redevelopment Project.

The first consultation was conducted from November 2019 to January 2020 with a series of 46 face to face / community drop-in sessions, where AWM staff travelled to each state or territory to garner views from interested stakeholders. The consultation was targeted to those with an existing interest in the AWM including veterans, defence families and ex-service groups.

The second consultation in February 2020 was online, with a demographically representative survey specifically targeted at understanding community response to the Redevelopment project on the AWM's social heritage values.

The two consultations resulted in the AWM receiving feedback from more than 1,000 Australians. The Consultation Report was submitted with the application. The Consultation Report concludes:

"Support for the project was strong across a variety of audience and age groups. Support was consistently above 70% in all States/Territories, with the notable exception of the ACT, and levels of supportive participants were higher than the level of not supportive or neutral participants at 44 of 46 events conducted."

NCA Consultation

The NCA's 'Commitment to Community Engagement' details how the NCA conducts consultation. The purpose is to achieve a greater level of consistency and transparency in the NCA's decision making process.

In accordance with the Commitment to Community Engagement, the NCA notifies works applications for 15 business days. Due to the significant national interest in the AWM Early Works, the NCA extended the standard notification timeframe for the AWM Early Works application to 30 business days / six weeks.

Part 2.7 Works Applications and Attachment C Protocol for Development Applications for Works Which Require Consultation of the NCA's 'Commitment to Community Engagement' describe the consultation process for WA applications. The NCA undertakes an assessment of whether a proposal is consistent with the National Capital Plan and level of public consultation required. An assessment is made in relation to adverse impacts on:

- public space and community amenity;
- environment, heritage or landscape values;

- amenity of the locality in terms of materials, finishes, scale, massing, design and quality; and
- consistency with an existing Heritage Management Plan.

When an application for works is lodged and public consultation is required, consultation with the community and stakeholders will be undertaken by the applicant, the NCA or both. Where consultation is undertaken by the applicant, the NCA may choose to stipulate specific requirements that the applicant is required to implement.

The NCA may set aside the requirement to undertake full public consultation where:

- previous consultation has been undertaken on the proposal;
- minor amendments to previously approved works are required;
- the NCA determines no stakeholders will be affected; and
- proposals are given exemption, as outlined in Part 2.3 of the 'Commitment to Community Engagement'.

Public consultation was undertaken on this application as it is a mandatory requirement under the National Capital Plan (NCP), and significant community interest has been demonstrated with respect to proposals for the AWM Redevelopment.

Public consultation was undertaken by the NCA between 20 March 2021 and 30 April 2021 in the following manner:

- On Saturday 20 March 2021, publishing a public notice in The Canberra Times outlining the proposed works and inviting submissions to be made to the NCA in relation to the proposal.
- Between 20 March 2021 and 30 April 2021, publishing details of the proposal on the NCA's website.
- Between 20 March 2021 and 30 April 2021, placing two A1 size signs on the site one sign adjacent to the footpath at the Treloar and Limestone Ave intersection (northern AWM) side and one sign adjacent to the footpath at the Treloar and Fairbairn Ave intersection (northern AWM side).
- On 19 March 2021, the NCA wrote to key stakeholders (included on the Works Approval and Strategic Planning Key Stakeholder List) via email advising of the consultation process and inviting comments.

The NCA received 601 submissions on the proposal. The key issues raised in the submissions were:

- Tree Removal and impacts on heritage values.
- Preservation of the Eucalypts should be prioritised.
- Impacts on Heritage Values.
- Demolition of Anzac Hall.
- Cost of Works.

- Concern the Early Works are being considered separately from the Major Redevelopment Works; and
- Concern about the consultation process.

Emails of acknowledgment were sent to submitters advising them that their submission would be taken into consideration before a decision would be made on the application. Issues raised in the submissions and NCA's response to all issues raised are detailed in the Consultation Report published on the NCA's website.

Conclusion on public consultation

To the extent that submissions to the Authority raised matters relevant to whether the proposed works are not inconsistent with and are in accordance with the Plan, those matters were considered by me in reaching my findings that the proposed works are not inconsistent with and are in accordance with the Plan, as set in this statement of reasons.

To the extent that submissions raised other matters against approval of the proposed works, I considered that they were not reasons to refuse works approval.

Consideration of Moral Rights

The application before the NCA includes the demolition of Anzac Hall. Anzac Hall was designed by Denton Corker Marshall Pty Ltd - a Melbourne based architectural practice. On 21 December 2000, amendments to the *Copyright Act 1968* came into effect. These amendments introduced an obligation on the AWM, as a building owner, to consult with the original design architects for Anzac Hall. The NCA sought assurance from the AWM that it has discharged its moral rights obligations under the *Copyright Act 1968* as part of this assessment.

I have considered the assurance received from the AWM and the response of John Denton (by letter dated 18 October 2018). I accept the AWM's assurance that the AWM has discharged its moral rights obligations.

DECISION AND REASONS

On 4 June 2021, I decided to approve the proposed Early Works.

I assessed the proposed works as being in accordance with the Plan based on the findings of fact as set out above. As I was satisfied that the proposed works were in accordance with the Plan, I considered it appropriate to grant works approval. I considered that the reasons put forward by submitters against works approval that did not relate to whether the proposed works are in accordance with the Plan, were not reasons to refuse works approval.
